PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

In our classrooms, all students will engage in meaningful, enjoyable experiences that will teach them how to think critically and interact socially. The key to future success is literacy, so all subject areas will be enriched with opportunities for analytical thinking, reading, writing, and debating. Technology will be an integral part of the curriculum, which will empower students to meet the demands of a rapidly changing society. At Hayt, all students, staff, and families will be encouraged to share their diverse ideas, so we may continue to grow as life-long learners.

Breakfast in the Classroom	8:15 a.m. to 8:30 a.m.

Breakfast in the Classroom (BIC) is served when teachers escort their students to the classroom at the beginning of the day. Students who arrive after their classroom is picked up will have an opportunity to receive a breakfast bag until 8:22 a.m.

VISITORS

Classroom visits must be approved by the office. Parent or guardian visits should be done before or after school. This procedure is strictly enforced in order to maintain focus on academics and to keep a safe learning environment for all the students at Hayt School.

ENTRANCE PROCEDURES

Outside Pick Up

Once on school grounds, students are not to leave for any reason. If there is a problem, come to the main office. Outside, classroom numbers are located on the playground. For safety reasons and because of the high number of children, large and small, students cannot engage in any play before school. Students are to wait near their classroom line up location and **keep their book bag with them at all times, no exceptions**. Students should wait for their teacher to pick up the class for the start of school. Lastly, do not litter on school grounds; four garbage cans are located in the playground area to dispose of trash.

Inclement Weather

In the morning, when the temperature falls below 40 degrees with the wind chill factor and/or there is inclement weather, students will come inside to wait for the start of the school day. Students should keep their book bags with them at all times. Students should go to their grade level designated area: lunchroom - K to $3^{\rm rd}$, auditorium - $4^{\rm th}$ to $7^{\rm th}$, $8^{\rm th}$ – auditorium balcony.

Late Arrivals

If you arrive to school after 8:22 a.m. (tardy bell) you will need to fill out a tardy slip. After you have the tardy slip, you are to go the shortest way possible to your classroom. Any students "wandering" to class risk disciplinary action. **After each set of 3 tardies, a student may receive a detention.**

CPS PROMOTION / GRADUATION POLICY

Decisions to promote or retain elementary school students are based on successful completion of curriculum, behavior, attendance and performance on the District Wide Assessment (DWA) currently it's the *Measures of Academic Progress* (MAP) test. Students in benchmark grades 3, 6, and 8 are subject to the following considerations:

- Score at the 24th percentile or higher on the DWA in reading & mathematics.
- Have grades of "C" or higher in reading & mathematics.
- 8th graders must also either pass the district wide writing assessment or receive a grade of "C" or higher in their writing grade
- · Have no more than 9 unexcused absences

Student performance of the above criteria must conclusively demonstrate sufficient mastery for promotion to the next grade level. The accomplishment of the outlined criteria will result in promotion of students at the benchmark grades.

In late May or early June, students whose MAP scores are below the promotion score will automatically have their promotion status reviewed based on additional criteria for the academic year.

WELLNESS POLICY

Stephen K. Hayt is a healthy school. All food brought into school for any celebration should be cleared by the office. Food should follow the healthy school guidelines. Food and beverages such as cakes, cookies, cupcakes, pop, ice cream, and other sweets are not allowed. Please consider healthy options for all class parties and school lunches. Thank you for your support!

ATTENDANCE POLICY

Being on-time to school every day will result in academic success and financial funding for Chicago Public Schools, which will result in a better school system for current and future generations of Chicago students.

The only valid reasons for students to be considered excused from school include the following:

- illness
- · observance of a religious holiday
- · death in the immediate family

When a student is absent from school, a parent/guardian must call the school at 773-534-2040 before 8:15 a.m. When the student returns to school, the parent/guardian will need to provide a written and signed note explaining why the student was absent from school. If a student accumulates 9 days of unexcused absences, the Chicago Public School's Board of Education will seek to adjudicate the parent/guardian. In addition to receiving the maximum education possible, the benefits you may receive for attending school include:

- Perfect Attendance Certificate
- Incentives, such as pencils for primary grades
- Classroom/Grade activities for overall classroom/ grade performance

A student is considered tardy if he/she arrives after 8:22 a.m. A half day absence will be marked if a student leaves/arrives - before/after 11:45 AM, depending on the circumstance. A student may serve after school detentions after each set of 3 tardies.

DRESS CODE POLICY

At Hayt School, our primary concern is the safety of our students. Therefore, we find it necessary to have a dress code. Hayt's dress code is plain navy blue pants or skirts (no jeans or denim like material), and a plain navy blue or white shirt or blouse, any Hayt t-shirt and solid color shoes with matching color shoe laces. This dress code will distinguish our children from other children in and around Hayt School. In order to make this a success, we need 100% cooperation with this policy. Students should be wearing the dress code described above by the second week of school. Our goal is to ensure a safe and suitable environment for learning. Implementation of this plan will help accomplish this goal. In addition, because we are concerned for the safety of students and feel strongly that an appropriate appearance sets a positive tone for learning, the following guidelines for student expectations have been established:

- Appropriate hygiene and appearance are expected.
- Accessories, such as sweaters and sweatshirts, also must conform with our school colors, a plain navy blue & white.
 No sweatshirts with hoods allowed.
- Gang colors or symbols are not permitted on school grounds.

- Clothing with inappropriate graphics or slogans are not permitted.
- Items such as rubber-bands around the ankles, certain body piercing and hats are not allowed.
- Extremes in dress, hair (style or color), make-up, and jewelry not in good taste are prohibited.
- Shoes must be worn at all times. For safety reasons, no open-toe shoes, such as flip-flops, sandals or slippers, may be worn.

HOMEWORK POLICY

The Chicago Public Schools mandates that homework be regularly assigned to students. Homework may account up to 10% of a student's overall grade. Homework should be a sequence of well-planned, meaningful assignments for completion during out-of-class time. The specific amount and frequency of assigned homework should be generally based on student needs, interests, and the content of the instructional program. Students should also be given long-term assignments, projects, and research from time to time. Homework is a necessary component in the sequence of a child's education and should be assigned to...

- Provide reinforcement, practice, application, and enrichment of what is learned in class
- · Prepare students for class participation
- Develop independent and responsible work and study habits
- Extend learning activities beyond the school hours
- Provide an opportunity for student creativity
- Foster a closer relationship between home and school
- Provide opportunities for the student to gain experience in the utilization of community resources
- Provide for positive on-going parental involvement in the student's education

The following are suggested time allocations for teacherdirected homework assignments for all subjects:

- Kindergarten: 15 minutes per day
- Grades 1st, 2nd and 3rd: 30 minutes per day
- Grades 4th, 5th and 6th: 45 minutes per day
- Grades 7th and 8th: 90 minutes per day

Students have the following responsibilities under the homework policy.

Students are responsible for maintaining a homework assignment notebook, which lists subjects, assignment dates, due dates and dates turned in; (An agenda book is provided free of charge to each student at the beginning of the year). Students are expected to complete all homework assignments carefully and accurately and to turn them in by the due date. After an excused absence, a student will be given 3 days to make up the work. Students should make necessary corrections on their returned homework and share with their parents the teacher's

evaluation of homework assignments. Students are to seek help, as needed, from parents and teachers.

LUNCHROOM PROCEDURES

Students are to walk through the lunch line once in an orderly and respectable manner and choose what they would like to eat (second helpings are not permissible). For health concerns, students should wash their hands before eating and not share food with other students. An acceptable level of volume is expected while students *remain* seated with their *own* classroom. Upon dismissal, tables are to be cleared, all trash picked up off the floor and thrown into the garbage. Milk is to be poured into the buckets provided. Adults are available to help students; to get their attention, students need to raise their hand.

COMPUTER ACCEPTABLE USE POLICY

The **World Wide Web** (www) is to enhance / supplement the education of our students and staff, not replace any aspect of the curriculum, or to be obtrusive to the present learning environment. Students will not use search engines without authorization from their classroom teacher or another staff member. Students are not allowed to access and / or navigate the Internet without the constant direct supervision of their classroom teacher or another staff member. Internet access will only be used for specific classroom projects. Students are not to just simply explore the Internet; they must log in and out and provide a brief description of the project. The use of the Internet is a privilege; misuse will result in termination of the users' Internet privileges. Students will be held responsible for using the Internet in an appropriate manner. Appropriate is defined as all behaviors and actions which do not break any of the CBOE Student Code of Conduct policies and / or societal laws. Any student found using the Internet in an inappropriate manner will be disciplined under the CBOE Student Code of Conduct. Any societal laws that are broken will be prosecuted by The Chicago Police Department or the federal government. The account user is to be the only person using the account unless the secondary user is under their direct supervision. Any material that is sexual in nature is not to be explored from school-based computers. The CBOE Student Code of Conduct, school rules, and societal laws apply while using all computer equipment. Any software brought in to Hayt School must be approved by The Hayt technical team, prior to installation and / or use. Programs should not be transferred electronically for school wide use without approval of the Hayt technical team. Students may not repair or reconfigure any computer hardware or software without the approval and / or supervision of a Hayt technical team member. Ordering of any software for Hayt School must be approved by the Hayt technical team and priority will be given to networkable and / or lab-based programs.

STUDENT DISCIPLINE

A copy of the *Student Code of Conduct* will be given to each student at the beginning of the year. At Hayt, we encourage all students to BE RESPECTFUL, BE RESPONSIBLE and BE DETERMINED TO ACHIEVE. We encourage all our students to resolve conflicts on their own when the problems are small and manageable. If resolution is not workable for any reason, students **must** take responsibility and ask an adult for assistance in resolving the conflict before it increases in severity.

Prohibited Items & Activities

In addition to items listed in the Student Code of Conduct, students may not possess the following items on school property or at school events without the explicit permission of an administrator.

- Chewing gum and/or candy on school property unless authorized by school personnel
- Wearing non weather or nonreligious head covers (i.e. hoods, baseball hats and "do-rags"), extra-long belts or wallet chains
- Skateboards, shoes with wheels (AKA: Heely's) and other injury prone items
- MP3 players, cameras, or any other electronic items of distraction
- Student possession of a cell phone requires a parent note submitted to the principal each year
- Electronic texting

DISMISSAL PROCEDURES

For safety reasons, students are not allowed to play on the playground equipment without parent supervision. Students are to follow school dismissal procedures, leave school grounds and go directly home. For safety reasons, crossing guards are located at Granville Ave. & Greenview Ave. & Clark St. & Granville Ave. When crossing busy streets, students should use the assistance of the crossing guards. Caution should always be used when crossing an unsupervised street. Students not picked up at dismissal, may go to the main office to call home.

EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Students **MUST** sign an afterschool agreement, have a minimum grade of a "C" in all subject areas, satisfactory attendance & GREAT behavior, and abide by the school dress code policy in order to participate in any extra-curricular activities.
